Proposed Stalking Protection (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to increase protection of victims of stalking by giving police the power to apply for stalking protection orders on behalf of victims. The consultation runs from 29 April 2019 to 21 July 2019. All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. The current approach is not practical from the victim's point of view and the effect on the stalker would be minimal i.e. they would only be prevented from interacting with someone who does not wish this interaction in any case while still allowing the stalker to carry on their life in all other domains. Some consideration should be given to prevent this from being misused as a tool to prevent a parent from seeing their children in disputes over custody.
